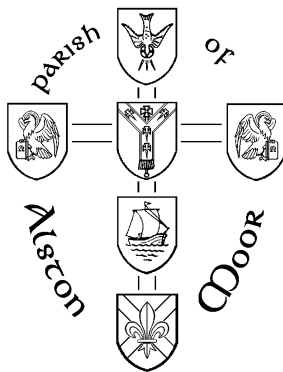


An Order for Night Prayer



Introduction to Compline (Night Prayer)

The ancient office of Compline derives its name from a Latin word meaning 'completion' (completorium). In keeping with the practice of St Benedict and the earliest monastic communities, Compline is offered when the work of the day is completed. As the quietness of evening settles over our hearts and minds, we come together in thankfulness for the blessings of the day which has passed, and in anticipation of God's gift of a new day.

In an increasingly secularised and materialistic world, the stillness and meditative nature of Compline speak to us of other values: spiritual values that nurture and sustain the soul. It can be a response to our hunger for the numinous and transcendent presence of God.

The Lord almighty grant us a quiet night and a perfect end.

A period of silence for reflection on the past day may follow

and raise us to new life in Christ.
Amen.**

○ God, make speed to save us;

All **○ Lord, make haste to help us.**

All **as it was in the beginning, is now
and shall be for ever. Amen.**



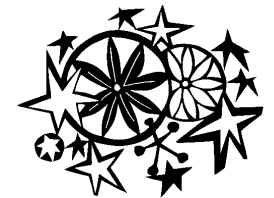
Hymn

The Collect

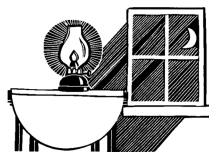
The Collect of the Day or one of the following Collects is said

Psalm 91

- 1 Whoever dwells in the shelter of the Most High ♦
and abides under the shadow of the Almighty,
- 2 Shall say to the Lord, 'my refuge and my stronghold, ♦
my God, in whom I put my trust.'
- 3 For he shall deliver you from the snare of the fowler ♦
and from the deadly pestilence.
- 4 He shall cover you with his wings
and you shall be safe under his feathers; ♦
his faithfulness shall be your shield and buckler.
- 5 You shall not be afraid of any terror by night, ♦
nor of the arrow that flies by day;
- 6 Of the pestilence that stalks in darkness, ♦
nor of the sickness that destroys at noonday.
- 7 Though a thousand fall at your side
and ten thousand at your right hand, ♦
yet it shall not come near you.
- 8 Your eyes have only to behold ♦
to see the reward of the wicked.

I will lift them up, because they know my name.
- 15 They will call upon me and I will answer them; ♦
I am with them in trouble,
I will deliver them and bring them to honour.
- 16 With long life will I satisfy them ♦
and show them my salvation.
